

Environmental Guidelines

Welcome to our resort! We're thrilled to have you here in this beautiful protected seascape. To help us preserve this incredible environment for generations to come, please observe the following guidelines during your stay:

Respect Marine Life

- Look, but don't touch: Observe marine animals from a distance. Do not touch, chase, or harass any marine life, including corals, fish, turtles, or dolphins.
- No feeding: Never feed marine animals. This can alter their natural behaviors and harm their health.
- Mind your fins and feet: When swimming, snorkeling, or diving, be mindful of your movements to avoid accidentally touching or damaging corals and other delicate marine organisms. If walking on the beach, be aware of bird nesting areas.

Responsible Waste Management

- Reduce, reuse, recycle: Help us minimize waste by reducing your consumption, reusing towels and linens, and recycling whenever possible. Look for designated recycling bins around the resort.
- Proper waste disposal: Dispose of all trash, including cigarette butts and food wrappers, in designated bins. Never litter on the beach or in the ocean.
- Avoid single-use plastics: We encourage you to use reusable water bottles and bags.
- Careful with chemicals: Do not dispose of any chemicals, oils, or non-biodegradable substances into drains or directly into the environment.

Water and Energy Conservation

- Conserve water: Water is a precious resource. Please take shorter showers, turn off faucets when not in use, and report any leaks to our staff.
- Save energy: Turn off lights, air conditioning, and other electronics when you leave your room.
- Towel and linen reuse: Kindly consider reusing your towels and linens for multiple days to reduce water and energy consumption.

Enjoying the Seascape Responsibly

- Stay on marked paths: When exploring the resort grounds or natural areas, please stick to designated paths to protect fragile vegetation and wildlife habitats.
- No collecting souvenirs: Do not remove any natural items from the seascape, such as corals, shells, sand, or plants.
- Responsible boating: If you're on a boat tour, please ensure it operates at a safe speed, avoids disturbing marine life, and anchors only in designated sandy areas to protect coral reefs.
